## The Problem:

$\square$ Students read a lot of information today in short bursts.
$\square$ They change channels and multi-task.
$\square$ To develop good reading comprehension we want them to sustain interest and finish the novels that they start reading.
$\square$ As soon as they are done we want them to have the desire to read another.
$\square$ Some classroom teachers are not familiar with current book series choices.

- Most teachers have a wide range of levels in their rooms.
$\square$ Ell students do not have the vocabulary to constantly learn new book terms.

$\square$ Have everyone just start with one series.

$\square$ Get everyone involved including parents.
$\square$ Stick to the series idea - tricky at first but it will pay off!
$\square$ Be flexible - you are changing bad habits for older kids. The younger grades are the easiest to start!

I am hoping that many of you have heard from your children about their "Novel Explo" class that has begun this year. The purpose of the Novel Explo is to have children read a series of books so that they improve comprehension and become better readers.
